Meeting Three - Prioritizing Problems/Creating Action Steps

1. Prioritize neighborhood attributes and ensure consensus
2. Discussion of action steps for each attribute
3. Assess financial and social resources necessary for each action step

Meeting Four - Distribute Action Plan with Action Steps

1. Distribute draft action plan
2. Establish consensus on action plan and proposed changes

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What is it?

The Great Northwest Independence Neighborhood Initiative or “Initiative” is a process whereby residents can:

- Create a vision for their neighborhood.
- Ensure that these neighborhoods are great places to live, work and raise a family.

Initiative Goals

The project will result in the *Great Northwest Independence Neighborhood Strategic Plan* that will outline short term action steps for investment in this area.

Residents will create short-term action steps that will include goals and objectives for implementation.

Objectives will also review available resources to ensure long term sustainability and future investment.

Process

The First District will be organized into groups by existing neighborhood boundaries.

City staff will be developing a survey for each of the neighborhood groups.

Next, a series of four meetings will be held for each neighborhood group. Each neighborhood group will have a series of Action Steps to encourage future investment.

In total, approximately 20 meetings will be held to listen to neighborhood residents, then assist residents in prioritizing goals and objectives.

This planning process is unique in that “one size does not fit all,” and that it can be adjusted to accomplish specific neighborhood tasks.

Group Five: McCoy, Heart of Independence, Town Hall, (District 1 Area Only), and Benton (District 1 Area Only)

The meeting dates for Group Five have been set as follows: 6:30 p.m. Thursdays, January 10 and 24 and February 7 and 28 in the gymnasium at Bryant Elementary School, 827 W. College.

At the project conclusion, a wrap-up meeting will be held to summarize ideas and ensure consensus.
